

- e. Application of National Assessment and accreditation council.



2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- e learning
- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

- **Role of faculty in facilitating such projects** The faculty encourages the students to undertake projects on diversified areas and in national institutions for collaborative work. They also supervise research projects.

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image, graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

- iii. Needs to have a departmental store.
- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University

This MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University was signed to facilitate exchange

programmes for students and faculty between the universities. It will play an important role in facilitating easy student exchange, faculty exchange, discussion of academics and joint research projects between the universities.

It will also facilitate interaction within South Korean industrial organisations as well as Indian industries. Over 600 industrial experts will be available from South Korea to interact with our industries as well as students unde the said MoU. 2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. In addition to this, automated acquisition module, technical processing module for new purchase (data entry, bar code generation and pasting) and circulation module for issue and return of books to the readers have been initiated with the LibSys integrated library management software. Library automation work management and back up management are administered through centrally controlled computer room. Almost all the housekeeping modules are computerized. They are listed below:

4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.)

Centralized internet facility to all students and faculty, we had taken 1 GBPS bandwidth under NKN project, 120 Mbps leased line from local BSNL, We had also started campus WiFi project under RUSA funding. We had created wifi zones in each building, boys hostel, girls hostel, Guest house, Library reading hall, etc. We are also maintain university website, online forms submission, online payment gateway facility, online student feedback process for last 10 years. All buildings in campus are connected with under ground optical fibre cable (23 Km). Total network points 3300+. WiFi labs are made at Academic Resource Centre, English Language lab, YCSRD. Moodle server is installed and maintained in the Data Centre of university. Moodle server is becoming popular for dissemination of course material and online tests. Library Internet Hall received 45 new desktops for centralised browsing facility to students and faculty. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- e learning
- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

- Research Policy is formulated
- Innovation and Incubation Cell is formed.

- Research Committee in each Department to scrutinise the projects.

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

- i. Limited number of staff in the consumer stores.
- ii. No vehicle for delivery of goods in the departments.
- iii. Needs to have a departmental store.
- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University

This MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University was signed to facilitate exchange

Over 600 industrial experts will be available from South Korea to interact with our industries as well as students unde the said MoU. The industries from Kolhapur can make most out of this facility by witnessing and interactions on their development and research.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. 4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.)

Centralized internet facility to all students and faculty, we had taken 1 GBPS bandwidth under NKN project, 120 Mbps leased line from local BSNL, We had also started campus WiFi project under RUSA funding. We had created wifi zones in each building, boys hostel, girls hostel, Guest house, Library reading hall, etc. We are also maintain university website, online forms submission, online payment gateway facility, online student feedback process for last 10 years. All buildings in campus are connected with under ground optical fibre cable (23 Km). Total network points 3300+. WiFi labs are made at Academic Resource Centre, English Language lab, YCSRD. Moodle server is installed and maintained in the Data Centre of university. Moodle server is becoming popular for dissemination of course material and online tests. Library Internet Hall received 45 new desktops for centralised browsing facility to students and faculty. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- e learning
- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

- Decentralization of examination

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

- Research Policy is formulated
- Innovation and Incubation Cell is formed.
- University Publication Cell is formed.
- Research Committee in each Department to scrutinise the projects.

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required :

Following are some of the problems faced by Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores.

- i. Limited number of staff in the consumer stores.
- ii. No vehicle for delivery of goods in the departments.
- iii. Needs to have a departmental store.
- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University

This MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University was signed to facilitate exchange

Over 600 industrial experts will be available from South Korea to interact with our industries as well as students unde the said MoU. The industries from Kolhapur can make most out of this facility by witnessing and interactions on their development and research.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. In addition to this, automated acquisition module, technical processing module for new purchase (data entry, bar code generation and pasting) and circulation module for issue and return of books to the readers have been initiated with the LibSys integrated library management software. 4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.)

Centralized internet facility to all students and faculty, we had taken 1 GBPS bandwidth under NKN project, 120 Mbps leased line from local BSNL, We had also started campus WiFi project under RUSA funding. We had created wifi zones in each building, boys hostel, girls hostel, Guest house, Library reading hall, etc. We are also maintain university website, online forms submission, online payment gateway facility, online student feedback process for last 10 years. All buildings in campus are connected with under ground optical fibre cable (23 Km). Total network points 3300+. WiFi labs are made at Academic Resource Centre, English Language lab, YCSRD. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Annexure-III Best Practices

Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required :

Following are some of the problems faced by Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores.

- i. Limited number of staff in the consumer stores.
- ii. No vehicle for delivery of goods in the departments.
- iii. Needs to have a departmental store.
- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- 1. Availability of skilled labour for desedimentation of the wells
- 2. Safety and security of the visitors visiting the sites

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University

This MoU with South Korean Chonnam National University was signed to facilitate exchange

The industries from Kolhapur can make most out of this facility by witnessing and interactions on their development and research.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- e learning
- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

- **Role of faculty in facilitating such projects** The faculty encourages the students to undertake projects on diversified areas and in national institutions for collaborative work. They also supervise research projects.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The important examination reforms initiated by the University both for University Departments and affiliated colleges are indicated below:

- Continuous Internal Evaluation and Semester end examination
- e-Suvidha- Digital University Digital College (DUDC)
- Secured Remote Paper Delivery (SRPD) mode system:
- On-Line application for Convocation
- Decentralization of examination

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

- Research Policy is formulated
- Innovation and Incubation Cell is formed.
- University Publication Cell is formed.
- Research Committee in each Department to scrutinise the projects.

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Annexure-III Best Practices

Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

a milestone for both institutions and will help strengthen educational and IT technology cooperation. The MoU will bring the two institutions together to work closely on big data analysis, free and open source data mining embedded systems, wireless sensor network, Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) design, software engineering and multilingual technologies. The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. In addition to this, automated acquisition module, technical processing module for new purchase (data entry, bar code generation and pasting) and circulation module for issue and return of books to the readers have been initiated with the LibSys integrated library management software. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

1. NIRF Ranking

Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) Shivaji University bagged the 28th position in the rankings announced by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) for the year 2015-16.

2. Easier pattern for Examination revaluation

The Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK) has tweaked its post-examination reevaluation pattern to make it student-friendly. Students can file for re-evaluation of the subject concerned online and would not be required to be present in person at the university. Earlier, it was mandatory for the students to be present at the varsity to submit their re-evaluation application. The re-evaluation application can be submitted at the college and the college authorities will have to forward it to the university, thus reducing students' time and money. The decision, in its first phase is made applicable for engineering students.

3. Granthmahotsav

SUK celebrated its 11th Granth Mahotsav on the university campus from February 23 to 25, 2016. The event has been organised for the university's 53rd convocation ceremony for which over 50,000 visitors, including students, were on the campus. For the event 50 book stalls were set up from where visitors boutght books. The books included competitive book publishers, social, intellectual and other literary works of various authors. Many of the publishers had offered a discount of 20-30% on the books.

4. National Youth Parliament Competitions

National Youth Parliment was organized on September 3, 2016. This was a healthy initiative for the growth of the students and it helped a lot to the students to get to know about how parliament functions. The SUK campus had a different view on this occasion as various 'ministers' were given oath to and others answered the questions of the opposition and speaker intervening promptly from time to time. The students from Department of technology, Department of Nanotechnology and the Shahaji Law College displayed how a Parliament functions. Shahaji Law College team was declared winner team and it has straight away organised a group level competition on September 14, 2016.

5. Encouraging the researchers for state level state level Avishkar research festival.

Four out of ten projects by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), bagged awards at the state-level Avishkar research festival held in Pune on January 18, 2016. 43 students and faculty members from SUK took part in the festival. Ten projects made it to the final round. The university circular mentioned that the MBA department's assistant professor Gandhali Kharge won the second prize in the commerce and management category, while student Mohammed Faniband also bagged the second prize in the same category.

Afrin Attar from the Bharati Vidyapith won the first prize in the pure sciences category, while Abhinandan Patil from Tatyasaheb Kore College of Pharmacy won the first prize in the pharmacy category. The festival was organized in six educational categories, which include humanities, commerce, pure sciences, agriculture and animal husbandry, engineering and technology, and medicine and pharmacy. It was categorised for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars and faculty members.

The district-level, and university-level Avishkar research festival was organised in Sangli, Satara and Kolhapur districts in December.Uni bags four awards at state level Avishkar fest.

6. First textile incubator launched

A textile business incubator (TBI) under the Shivaji University, Kolhapur (SUK), was inaugurated at the DKTE society's Textile and Engineering Institute in Ichalkaranji on January 21, 2016. The centre will help mentoring and guiding students about quality research and how to proceed with it at the international level. Department of science and technology (DST) has allotted a grant of Rs5.40 crore for the project. The TBI centre will be useful in mentoring business planning, providing technical assistance, and other required help. The incubator will also provide upcoming businesses with space for services and training. Since it has been authorised by the university, it holds more weight and is the reason for people to contact the centre and take a look. Though the TBI centre's focus will be mentoring students, it will also be used for research and developing new services to enhance existing knowledge and technology. The centre, which has been started in the rural area, is the first one of its kind in the country and SUK as well.

7. Launching Art Gallery for showcasing 20th century Kolhapur artist.

An art gallery dedicated to the well-known master painter Abalal Rahiman on August 28, 2015 was inaugurated. The said gallery is all set to provide a valuable platform for the artists at the city-based Rangabahar organization. Abalal Rahiman, had made over 20,000 paintings in the era of 1890 to 1931, and was appreciated by the Chhatrapati Shahu maharaj. Rahiman had depth in his paintings, which depicted the details in the physical sciences, social and economic status of his time.

8. Setting up of Virtual Classroom

Virtual Classroom facility was set up on SUK campus and made functional on June 26, 2016 under the grants in aid by RUSA. This virtual clasroom would give the freedom to teach and learn from anywhere in the room as well as through remote centers with the internet connectivity. The resource person will be able to explain using an Interactive dualboard and the student would interact through a Blue Tooth Class Pad. Ready made content will be interactively taught and live experiments, diagram, maps, 3d objects will be discussed through a document camera. In this process through the interactivity of the students and the teachers instant content is also planned to be developed digitally. Subsequently we are planning that the entire curriculum gets developed, class wise, teacher wise and subject wise which is available to one and all. To give the Teacher more time to concentrate on next chapter while the class is completing an exercise, an Interactive panel gives complete charge of the PC using a pen, right in front of the desk. To assess the level of understanding of the students, assessment is done and MIS will be generated which is a ready data to help students to perform better. This classroom will truly the conduit to apply ICT in classroom at Shivaji University and will reach to the colleges through the bandwidth provided under national Knowledge Network.

9. Submission of proposals for GIAN Programme

Govt. of India initiated Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN) in Higher Education aimed at tapping the talent pool of scientists and entrepreneurs, internationally to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India so as to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence. Shivaji University submitted 13 proposals for GIAN programmes out of which 7 were granted by the MHRD for the year 2016-17 in disciplines ranging from Science, Technology, and Humanities to Languages.

10. MoUs



The Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), Pune on Friday April 1, 2016 signed a MoU with the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under the agreement, the two institutions will exchange expertise related to information and communication technology. The MoU is

The MoU will also help institutes expose students to cutting-edge skills. Apart from this, seminars, workshops and training sessions on innovation and research can be arranged in the future. Under the MoU, experts from C-DAC can be appointed in the university while last year's computer department students can also get an internship at C-DAC.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

Innovative processes adopted by some of the departments go on following lines:

1. Curriculum framing using web metrics:

The refurbishment of the basic teaching-learning model due to the renaissance of online media and its adoption in the higher education realms is being increasingly seen especially in the present decade. Though there are good number of reforms in the basic instructional model, the very basis of the same i.e. curriculum framing is given due attention. In view of the scholarly literature so far there is not a single attempt to the best of our knowledge to utilize the website metrics as an input for the curriculum framing, though the sole model of teaching-learning is seen migrating on it. In the Department of Computer Science based on the student survey mapping of the curriculum was accomplished. The results are thus very encouraging from various dimensions. They not only give an overview of advanced and otherwise learners, but also help in pacing the curriculum so as to enhance the academic performance of the students. Besides curriculum mapping and pacing, our approach has also helped in curriculum structuring and restricting on the basis of prerequisites. We are in a process to extend the model by adopting social media such as blogs, wikis, forums so as to reach out the other stakeholders and society at large. The presented model will be thus progressing towards the blending of the traditional curriculum framing models given by the reputed academicians such as Tyler, Taba and Oliva reinforced by the inclusion approach possible only with the ubiquitous penetration of web.

2. MOODLE based Teaching-Learning.

In the year 2014-15, all the departments hosted minimum one academic programme on MOODLE platform. In order to make this possible there were good number of workshops for the faculty members as well as the learners as regards to use this platform. A faculty coordinator per department was appointed for this purpose that could effectively motive his/her colleagues to shift their teaching-learning through online platform. A few Departments even conducted their evaluation on the MOODLE platform and marks were declared soon after the evaluation.

3. Perceiving the Learners behaviour in On-Line paradigm

Since all the oncampus departments shifted at least one of their academic programmes on the MOODLE platform, it was possible to perceive the learning behaviour through MOODLE analytics. The analytics revealed the learners pace of acquiring the resource materials as well as other details. Results of the same were presented in an international conference of MOODLE developers in Australia which showcases the readiness of Shivaji University towards online teaching-learning. A few useful suggestions as regards to the user interface were offered to the MOODLE developers from the developing countries perspectives.

4. Blended Teaching-Learning

In addition to the online teaching learning other blended techniques such as thinkpair, experiential learning through projects in industries, soft skills improvements through the Mock Interview laboratory have been achieved.

5. Catering to diversity

Induction programme for the newly admitted students are organized through Academic Departments, Central Library and Health Camps through Health Centre and Coordinators of various schemes

6. Efforts towards the student centric teaching-learning

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

Research Sensitization:

The University has an elaborate policy for research promotion in the affiliated colleges, according to which it inspects and recognizes research laboratories; recognizes research guides from amongst the college teachers; conducts workshops on topics such as writing research proposals, research papers, methodology for thesis writing etc. The Lead College Scheme of the University is helpful for this purpose. Two senior teachers exclusively from the affiliated colleges are nominated on the Departmental Research Committees of the University.

The University, out of its own funds, provides special research grants of Rs. 10 lakhs per year to the college teachers whose colleges are not covered under UGC section 2(f) 12(B). Selected proposals are eligible to receive maximum grant of Rs. 25,000/-each.

The University has taken lead in organizing workshops on Research Techniques. The IQAC of University and the District wise Lead Colleges jointly organized total 30 research workshops during 2014-15 on research methodology, research ethics, publishability, academic writings, and plagiarism.

The university has extended the support services like instrumentation and internet facilities to college teachers at subsidized rates. Collaborative research projects are undertaken with college teachers in some of the university departments.

Research Promotion:

A special committee of senior faculty members has been appointed by IQAC to formulate the research policy. Salient features of the same are as follows:

The Research proposals are first scrutinized by the Research Committees of respective departments and then sent to the funding agencies.

The M. Phil. and Ph. D. proposals are first scrutinized by the respected Departmental Research Scrutiny Committees. The modifications if any are incorporated in the draft proposal. The final copy of the synopsis is recommended to the Research & Recognition Committee (RRC). The RRC can also modify if required. Such modifications are communicated to the candidates. After approval of the RRC, the Board of University Teaching and Research (BUTR) in the respective faculties approves the title and synopsis.

IQAC in the year 2014-15 appointed a committee for formulation of research policy of the Shivaji University. The vision and objectives set were as follows:

Research Vision:

The Shivaji University strives to realize excellence in the thrust areas of the departmental research, undertake all types of consultancies, activate collaborative research for competitive outcomes, applicability, patentability, publishiability and serviceability.

Objectives

1. To encourage the faculty, staff and students for quality research in the University.

2. To undertake consultancy services to industry, institutions and individuals.

3. To encourage the faculty to publish their research and scholarly works in reputed international journals and books.

4. To motivate researchers for patentability of their research work.

5. To streamline the rules and regulations for research and consultancy activities in the University.

The draft policy has been finalized deliberated in the meetings of the committee. Suggestions from various stakeholders have been invited. The policy is in its final stage and will be put in force after due approval of the University authorities.

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





4.2 Computerization of administration and library

The work of retro-conversion of library active collection was completed in LibSys integrated library software package in the year 2008. The bibliographic information about the collection is made available through library OPAC/Web OPAC system. 4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.)

Centralized internet facility to all students and faculty, we had taken 1 GBPS bandwidth under NKN project, 120 Mbps leased line from local BSNL, We had also started campus WiFi project under RUSA funding. We had created wifi zones in each building, boys hostel, girls hostel, Guest house, Library reading hall, etc. We are also maintain university website, online forms submission, online payment gateway facility, online student feedback process for last 10 years. All buildings in campus are connected with under ground optical fibre cable (23 Km). Total network points 3300+. WiFi labs are made at Academic Resource Centre, English Language lab, YCSRD. Moodle server is installed and maintained in the Data Centre of university. Moodle server is becoming popular for dissemination of course material and online tests. Library Internet Hall received 45 new desktops for centralised browsing facility to students and faculty. Affiliated college students and external students are also using said facility for submission of online examination / convocation forms. Three blade servers in the Data Centre are made available to research workers in the Bioinformatics and chemistry departments. Pioneering research work has been made using this computing facility. Research papers published have got significant citation index. This year new web applications have been developed for paperless office and e-governance: 1. Student feedback system, online examination. 2. University elections 2017. 3. Online exam processing for CAP. 4. Online Recruitment portal. 

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

Objectives of a University as defined in the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 include promoting gender equality and sensitivity in society. Even before the implementation of this Act, the Centre for Women's Studies has been contributing to gender sensitization of various stakeholders of Shivaji University and other cross-sections of society towards attaining the long-term goal of gender equality.

In the year 2015-2016 the Centre continued the data collection for ongoing gender audit of Shivaji University towards contributing to making it a gender sensitive institution.

The Centre integrated gender sensitization in various events focusing on women's education, women and politics; and career options in Women's Studies, etc. in the following manner:

1.Sensitivity towards women's issues is a criterion for admissions to M.A. in Women's Studies. Therefore candidates aspiring for Women's Studies courses were given a brief orientation to gender sensitization on 8th and 15th July 2015 in small batches.

2. The issue of pending Women's Reservation Bill was chosen as the focus for gender sensitization on the occasion of Late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's death anniversary on 31st October 2015. The potential of Women's Reservation Bill in transforming power relations among women and men was discussed.

3.On 3rd January 2016, while observing Savitribai Phule birth anniversary, women's education was chosen as the focal theme for gender sensitization. Students were sensitized about mid-18th Century issue of women's education as against the privileged status of all girls who have reached the PG level. Gender sensitization session further focused on the gender gap persistent in professional education even in the 21st century.

4.Two workshops were organized on 8th and 9th March 2016. On 8th March the focus was on the assessment of gender sensitivity of students of M.A. in Women's Studies. They were asked to offer personal narratives on "How Women's Studies Changed our Lives". This was followed by another workshop on 9th March, wherein the soft-skills training by Dr. Smrutika Patil as the Resource person highlighted the gaps in students' gender sensitivity. The importance of gender sensitivity as an integral part of soft-skills was emphasized.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:

Shivaji University is committed to meeting the educational, social, cultural and economic needs of the region and the nation to create a just and humane society.

Mission:

We are dedicated to promoting and fostering a culture of high quality teaching and learning, and serving the societal needs by encouraging, generating and promoting excellence in research and extension activities.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, the University does have MIS. The University is playing vital role in updating the information of University on Management Information System (MIS) developed by Director, Higher Education, Pune. University also ensures that all of its Affiliated Colleges registered in MIS should update the information on time.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The policies of the national level apex bodies like UGC, AICTE, BCI, NCTE, National Universal Education Quality Framework (NUEQF), National Vocational Council (NVC), National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) and other related agencies, and the Central/State Governments provide certain directives about the curriculum design which are taken into account while framing / revision of curriculum. The subject related research councils also provide broad guidelines about the course work and curriculum design. Such policies and the local demands are considered while designing the curriculum and the course work. The feedbacks from various stakeholders are also taken into account while doing so. The Departmental Committees reviews all such policy issues and then the curriculum and course work is designed well in advance and forwarded to the respective BOS and Faculties. The needbased assessment of the existing curricular content is closely monitored by the BOS in various subjects. In the deliberations of the Academic Council, BOS, (in which external subject experts are invited) Faculties and Dean's meetings, content and revision of curriculum are discussed. The proposed curriculum is displayed on the University web-site inviting comments of the teachers from the affiliated colleges, Departments and students prior to its finalization and approval of the Faculties and Academic Council. The teachers are oriented about a new course curriculum. Periodical updates are made in the curriculum as and when required.

Shivaji University encourages the affiliated colleges to provide skill-oriented programmes relevant to the regional needs. The affiliated colleges are free to design the need based skill-oriented certificate and diploma courses for which they receive substantial funding from the UGC under the XI Five Year Plan (Merged Schemes and under Innovative Programme Scheme of UGC). There are 124 Add on-Courses, 35 Diploma Courses and 15 Advanced Diploma Courses started by the affiliated colleges, which have received grants to the tune of Rs. 7 lakhs each from the UGC.

The learner's flexibility is introduced through Choice Based Credit System. All P.G. departments (32) on the campus are having Academic Flexibility to design and revise their own courses. These courses are simultaneously introduced at the P.G. centres in the affiliated colleges. About 50% of the syllabus belongs to the core area. The elective options are designed on the basis of the skill based and applied nature of the papers. The students have cafeteria to choose from the electives.

Each semester paper is having four units of 15 contact hours each. Each semester has 60 contact hours. One credit point is assigned to 15 contact hours each. Credit points are calculated on the basis of the grade points. The marks obtained by the students are converted into grade points and then the credit points.

The University facilitates Dual Degree Programme wherein students can simultaneously enroll for one UG/PG course in regular mode and other courses conducted by the Centre for Distance Education.

The Centre for Distance Education offers 10 programmes with 334 courses in the faculty of Arts, Social Science, Commerce and Management and one IDS Course, Master of Valuation (Real Estate).

Need based programmes with employability in emerging areas are major factors which encourage University to undertake interdisciplinary programmes. M.Sc. in Applied Sciences, M.Sc. in Nanoscience and Technology and MCA, MBA, MSW courses under Yashwantrao Chavan School of Rural Development, MBA (Executive) and Master of Valuation under distance mode, M.A. (Music) and other self supporting programmes run by the University are some of the examples of interdisciplinary courses.

Quality sustenance and enhancement measures followed by the University for effective development of curriculum are as follows:

- Advice from the industry experts.
- Representation of industry experts, subject experts from other Universities and Research institutes on the respective BOS.
- Teacher Training on revised curriculum.
- Mechanism of sub-committees on special areas.
- MoUs with international and national institutes of repute.
- Detailed deliberation on curriculum in the academic bodies like BOS, Faculties and Academic Council.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Following innovative teaching approaches/ methods/practices adopted by the faculty in the Departments.

- e learning
- Think pair share among the students e.g. lab work, computer work, assignment, library work,
- Group discussion
- Poster Sharing among the research
- Brain storming on issues/problems students, special
- Panel discussions
- Seminar presentations
- Concept mapping by the students and teachers
- Blended learning (multiple use of learning strategies and styles)

There is a positive impact on the students with these methods adopted in teaching-learning activities. The impact is measured on the basis of participatory approach by the teachers, students' vertical advancement, their involvement in academic and research programmes and performance in various examinations and placements.

These points are considered while adjudging the Best Teacher Award. Appreciation letter from the Vice-Chancellor is issued to such faculty.

Around 80% of the course work programmes have mandatory project work mandatory. Projects are compulsory for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C students. They are evaluated by the external examiners. Some of the diploma courses in science and social sciences faculties have the mini project work. The weightage of marks ranges from 50 to 200.

• Number of projects executed within the university

All the students appearing for M.Ed., M. Com, M. Sc., MCA, MBA, B. Tech., M. Tech., MRS, MSW, M.J.C. course work on the campus are entitled to work on the research projects assigned by the respective departments. This number is around 1,200 per year.

- **Role of faculty in facilitating such projects** The faculty encourages the students to undertake projects on diversified areas and in national institutions for collaborative work. They also supervise research projects.

The Examination Section follows the schedule of paper-setting, printing of question papers through RBI recognized Printing Press, coding, evaluation, decoding and declaration of results. These reforms are implemented fully. The results are declared as per the schedule.

The average time for declaration of results of examination is 30 days. Average time taken for the University Departments is less than 30 days. Shivaji University has a very good track record of declaring more than 70% results within 30 days. University arranges a special assessment programme in case of delay. The results are declared on University website and notice boards.

6.3.4 Research and Development

In the reporting period following initiatives were taken up:

- Research Policy is formulated
- Innovation and Incubation Cell is formed.
- University Publication Cell is formed.
- Research Committee in each Department to scrutinise the projects.

Major achievements are as follows:

- DST-PURSE: A major interdisciplinary programme amongst the eighteen Science and Technology Departments under DST-PURSE for which grant-in-aid of Rs. 9.00 crores has been sanctioned by DST and fully utilized by University Science Departments. Its second phase proposal is being sent.
- DBT-IPLS: Another noteworthy project is interdisciplinary Programme in Life Sciences under which Rs. 5.00 crores has been granted by DBT, New Delhi. Six departments are involved in this programme.
- TEQIP: Department of Technology has been sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crores under the TEQIP programme granted by the World Bank for research in all Engineering subjects (08).
- DST-SAIF: University has been granted Rs. 5.00 crores under DST-SAIF programme for purchase of sophisticated analytical instruments for interdisciplinary research in science departments.
- Good number of Ph.D. thesis were uploaded on the UGC-INFLIBNET ETD repository "Shodhganga"

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library houses 55 computers with high internet bandwidth of 20 MBPS leased line and additional 1 GBPS from National Knowledge Network (NKN) with a view to browsing, sharing and downloading of e-information (online/offline). LibSys integrated library software has been installed for library automation. Four separate OPAC nodes are operating for public access at the ground floor, near the entrance of the library and also OPAC facility is made accessible through campus LAN at all the departments. A series of printers such as Dot Matrix/Laser and Inkjet printers are housed in the library. Well designed library website/portal facilitates the overall information about the library and links to various eresources/contents. The library has downloading facility for students and faculty with instrumental devices such as database server, internal/external storage devices like hard disk, CDs/VCDs, scanner, printer and digital camera are available for storing the information available in textual, image. graphic, audio. video/multimedia formats. Surveillance system such as CC TV and biometric equipment are also housed at different sections of the library for security of the material. University Library has institutional membership to several organizations for sharing e-resources such as INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, British Council, Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi, Association of Commonwealth Universities, U.K., Current Science Association, Bangaluru and GDNET (Global Development Network). Library has planned to develop institutional repositories and Content management system for the users.

Necessary physical infrastructure such as Academic Resource Center, terrace reading hall, Ramp and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education for disabled students/faculty, extension of library building, adequate drinking and sanitary facilities etc are provided by the library.







Annexure-III Best Practices

Best Practice : 1

1. Title of the Practice : Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumers' Stores Limited, Vidyanagar, Kolhapur

- 2. Objectives of the Practice : Following are the objectives of the consumer stores.
 - i. To supply various goods needed by the university.
 - ii. To supply the educational materials to the students of university.
 - iii. To supply household provisions to families on and off university campus.
 - iv. To supply materials required by university departments for research, conferences and workshops.
 - v. To supply materials on demand to members of consumer stores.

3. The Context :

To achieve the goal of any institute, the supporting services play the equal role that of core. The institute like university, it has support services like consumer stores, hostels, printing press, student aid centre, international cell etc. One of the forefront support service which helps all the stakes of university such as administration, staff community for their daily business is consumer stores.

Shivaji University came in existence in 1962 in the historical city of Maharashtra as Kolhapur. Shivaji University has its goal to cater the academic needs of rural pupils who want to pursue their higher studies in various disciplines of Science, Commerce and Management, Humanities and Engineering and Technology. A beautiful campus located very close to Kolhapur city. It caters the academic needs of the students for their post-graduate and doctoral studies in the campus for almost 2500 both male and female students. It has also campus accommodation for academic and non academic staff.

In order to fulfil the daily domestic requirements of students and campus staff, the consumer store was started in 1967 in the university campus itself as per directives of UGC and Central Government of India. The infrastructure has been provided by the university and it run on nominal profit margin. At present it cater the needs of campus and off campus teaching and non teaching staff, students from boys and girls hostels, affiliated colleges, nearby government institutes.

4. The Practice :

Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores has very special points to be noted such as -

- 1) The consumer stores has 7 permanent staff and 3 daily wages staff which include one General Manager, one Sr. Clerk, Four Jr. Clerks and one peon.
- 2) The consumer store has 439 lakhs turnover in 2015-16 and net profit of 2.76 lakhs.
- Consumer store has a director body of 11 members which includes 6 directors nominated by Hon. Vice-Chancellor as A- class, 2 directors from affiliated colleges as B-class and 1

director from consumer stores operated by affiliated colleges as C- class. The general manager of consumer stores is an ex-officio member.

- 4) The director body has 5 years duration.
- 5) The total share capital of the consumer store is Rs. 41750/-.
- 6) The working of the store has been computerized.
- 7) Consumer stores gives due importance to its staff by providing Gratuity, accidental insurance, incentive from profit, loan facility along with their regular salary.
- 8) Consumer stores also does the philanthropic service as donating substantial amount to university R&D fund from its profit.

5. Evidence of Success :

The Stores supplies various goods and provisions at a commission of 3.5% to the Men's Hostel being run under the 'Earn and Learn' Scheme.

During 2015-2016, the Stores has earned a net profit of Rs.2,76,978/- on the turnover of Rs.4,39,17,299/-. The Stores' working capital stands at Rs 1.12 lakhs. The Stores has paid dividend to its members continuously for Ten years now. The Stores has paid a total sum of Rs.17,96,800/- to the University's Research and Development Fund.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required :

Following are some of the problems faced by Shivaji University Central Co-operative Consumer Stores.

- i. Limited number of staff in the consumer stores.
- ii. No vehicle for delivery of goods in the departments.
- iii. Needs to have a departmental store.
- iv. Limit of purchase is Rs. 25,000/- which is to be increased.
- v. All purchases through consumer stores are not done by university.

Best Practice : 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in Pure Potable Water
- 2. Objectives of the Practice: Following are the Objectives of the Rain Water Harvesting and Self Sufficiency in the Pure Potable Water
 - i) To store the rain water in campus reserviors
 - ii) To make available sufficient good quality water for Laboratory Hostels, residents
 - iii) To use the recycled water for the gardens and campus plantation
 - iv) To make available pure and processed water of same quality to all stake holders on campus

3. The Context:

Shivaji University is a NAAC is a premier higher education centre of learning in Southern Maharashtra with main campus at Kolhapur. It is established on 18 November, 1962 to fulfill the educational needs of the region. Having the sprawling area of 853 acres, campus development, nature conservation, biodiversity and beautification has been a focal concern of university. Initially, Rajaram lake on campus was a major source to meet it's water requirements. Kolhapur Municipal Corporation also served as an important source of potable water.

In the year 2015, the State of Maharashtra faced severe drought condition covering the western region of Maharashtra, including Kolhapur region with no exception to it. This paved way for everyone to think and act seriously about the water conservation strategies. Also increasing campus population (around 5000) covering the occupants of hostels, staff quarters, office and academic departments, have put forth the necessity for water storage at larger scale on the the campus. The daily consumption of potable water for campus is approximately 5 lacs liters. In order to meet this requirement and to provide sufficient clean water and to gain self sufficiency in water requirements, the projects like water conservation and rain water harvesting were thought upon. Also, to provide good quality water to all the stakeholders on campus, reverse osmosis system (R.O. System) was proposed and made functional.

Earlier, the university already had two small water reservoirs on campus to its credit. Among other water sources, seven wells can be included (constructed during the period from 1883 to 2015). However, these sources remained unexplored as far as water supply facilities are concerned. The university campus is divided by a highway of 100 feet, passing through it.

In the academic year 2015-16 due to drought situation observed in Maharashtram the Universities were directed and compelled to curtail the duration of academic session i.e. semester by a month. To overcome this problem and to make water available for the five thousand students, 100 families residing on campus the University authorities decided to take necessary steps.

4. The Practice:

The water resource management work was undertaken at different levels. These were creation of farm reservoirs, activating the wells on campus, channelizing water through

trenches on the campus to bring water into lakes and recycling of waste water from hostels for the purpose of maintenance of gardens.

The water resource management initiative resulted into creation of three farm reservoirs near well named as 'Sutar Vihir' region on campus. The association of the Directors of Physical Education from affiliated colleges and NSS volunteers contributed a lot in creation of these reservoirs.

Next initiative under this project was activating water channels of wells on university campus. University campus has seven wells, with limited access and use. Two wells were sedimented completely with no water at all. Therefore, while activating these wells, under water resource management, nearly 20 to 40 fts sludge was removed from them to channelize the water resources. This project went ahead smoothly and water resources got channelized in summer season, itself. After desedimentation, these wells are fenced with compound wall. The university incurred approximate expenditure of (desedimentation and construction) Rs. Six Lac on this project.

Third major step was taken to create trenches on campus to conserve and channelize rainwater sources to two reservoirs. Trenches of approximate, 2.5 km length were created without disturbing natural flow and direction of sources of water. University's continuous efforts started giving positive results from the very first rainfall itself. Gradually, the university was able to collect 30 crore liters of water on surface in addition to the underground storages by filtration.

Waste water management was undertaken by installing water recycling plant at hostel premises on main campus and hostel at Department of Technology. At present the recycled water is used for gardens, landscapes.

Also to provide good quality water to all stakeholders on campus a purification system with Reverse Osmosis Technology with capacity of one Lac litre per day is installed and filtered bottled water is supplied to all hostels, departments, administrative sections and residents in quarters on campus.

5. The Evidence of the Success

This year in the first month of rainfall i,e. In July, 2016 itself all water reservoirs on campus were filled their fullest capacity. Nearly 30 crore liters of water is stored which covers reservoirs namely Bhasha Bhavan lake (22 cr. 15 lac liters), Music Department lake (5 crore 20 lac liters), Sutar Vihir (4 lac liters), Sports Department well (4.87 lac liter), Chemistry Department well (3 lac liters), Synthetic track well (5 lac liter), Shinde well (3 lac liters), farm pond (35 lac liters).

The requirement of potable water is now fulfilled from the filteration plant with RO technology is installed at a well near sports department. Now, almost all water required for all purposes is served from the campus reservoirs. With this reform, University is able to save around 72 lac rupees per annum on account of water bills. It has also assured pure water supply for hostels, residential quarters and laboratories. The university's water conservation drive also activated and channelized water levels of the borewells of the residents near the campus.

• Water storage on campus recorded history with nearly 30 cr. liters.

- From those reservoirs University uses 10 lac liters of water every day. At present 10 lac liters per day water is consumed from this reservoirs on university campus.
- The water purchasing from Kolhapur Municipal Corporation is totally stopped which resulted into saving of Rs. 6 lac per month.
- If rainfall continues with the same rate, University campus could be self-reliant for a complete year including forthcoming summer days.
- It is expected that university campus could be self reliant on these water resources throughout year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- 1. Availability of skilled labour for desedimentation of the wells
- 2. Safety and security of the visitors visiting the sites
